

Piceance Project Fact Sheet

Description of Facilities:	<p>The Piceance Development Project is located in Rio Blanco County Colorado. It will develop acreage holdings in and around the Piceance Creek Unit.</p> <p>ExxonMobil has interest in approximately 300,000 acres in the Piceance Basin area. Nearly 90 percent of the surface is federal land, about 5 percent of the surface is State land, and approximately 5 percent of the surface is private or "fee" land.</p> <p>The Piceance Project includes drilling wells from multiple well pads; gas and liquid gathering systems; a gas trunk line system; a produced water pipeline and subsurface disposal system; two tank batteries; monitoring facilities; and a condensate sales and truck loading site. A central treating facility was built and is operated by Enterprise Products.</p>
Site History	<p>ExxonMobil has been producing natural gas in the Piceance Basin for nearly 50 years through its predecessor companies. The Piceance Creek Unit was formed in 1940 and has been in continuous production since the 1950s.</p>
Products & Shipment:	<p>ExxonMobil is currently producing approximately 100 million cubic feet per day of natural gas, most of which is produced primarily from the Mesaverde formation.</p> <p>Natural gas is delivered through one of several interstate pipelines that run through the area.</p>
Capacity:	<p>Initial development efforts in 2005 increased field processing capacity to 55 million cubic feet per day. Regulatory approval from the Bureau of Land Management was received in April 2007. The Piceance Project began operations in the first quarter of 2009, adding capacity of approximately 200 million cubic feet per day.</p> <p>Subsequent expansion phases are being evaluated, with the long-term potential for production to reach 1 billion cubic feet per day at its peak.</p>
Safety, Health, Environment:	<p>ExxonMobil is committed to ensuring the health and safety of its employees, contractors and the communities in which the company operates. ExxonMobil facilities and procedures are designed to promote a safe work environment.</p> <p>When ExxonMobil makes decisions about products, process or facility expansions, the impact they will have on the environment is one of the company's first priorities.</p> <p>ExxonMobil is minimizing the environmental impact of its operations by drilling and completing multiple deviated wells from</p>

a single surface location (multiple well pads). Additional activities have resulted in reductions of vehicle traffic and fresh water usage.

Community Support:

ExxonMobil is a long-time taxpayer in the State of Colorado. This project represents another significant investment in the State. This investment could potentially generate new jobs, increased tax revenue and economic growth for Rio Blanco County and the surrounding area.
